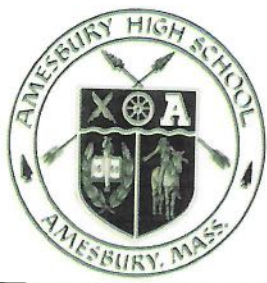

Google says the typical high school yearbook for 500 students is 64 pages. While we doubt any school around here has a book that small, it's still unusual for a school of 457 students to have 314 pages. Producing that requires organization and organization was exactly what was on display at the yearbook's annual Photo Day last Friday.

"The idea is for every senior to be in the yearbook four or five times," said advisor Barbara Leary. "It doesn't matter if you are the editors' best friends or the kid who does no school activities. We will find a way to get students into the book."

Getting students into the book means creating categories of photos that have nothing to do with belonging to a club or sport. There are pages for favorite food, favorite childhood thing, celebrity look-a-likes, a photo booth, and where the student works, among others. There are slide senior-sibling photos and superlatives. Boy, are

there superlatives, 75 of them at last count, each involving the top two vote getters.

On Thursday, seniors each received a schedule of when to report to the table outside 136. They were checked in by yearbook EIC's Lexi LeBlanc, Alice Moulton, and Lindsey Williamson. Runners were scheduled to go and get students who didn't show up.

AHS features something almost unheard of in other schools - mini pics. A mini pic is a small photo next to the student's portrait. It might be a sports photo or something taken by the yearbook staff. Jared Black took the

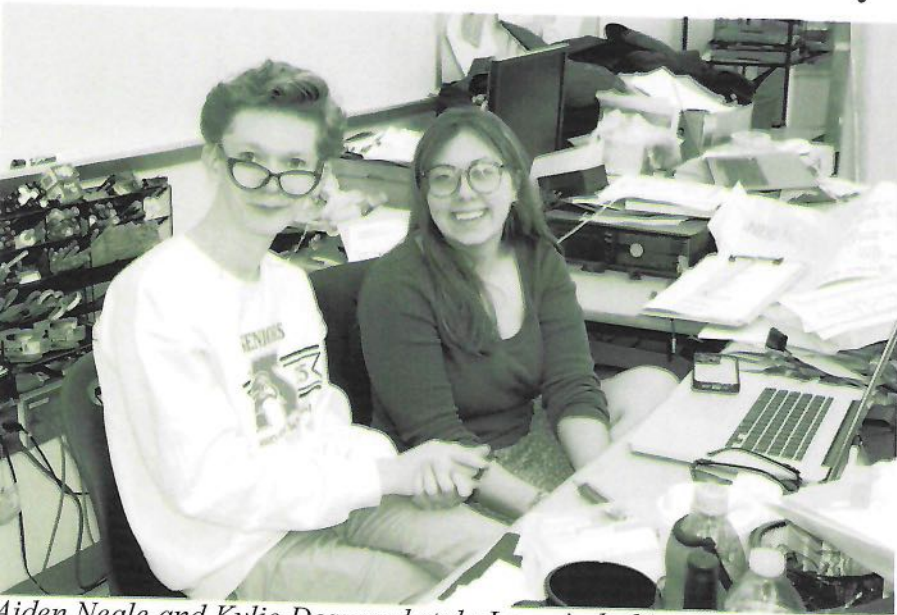
mini pics in room 136, while Kylie Desmond and Noah Aspeslagh helped athletes pick out mini pics from the newspaper and yearbook archives. 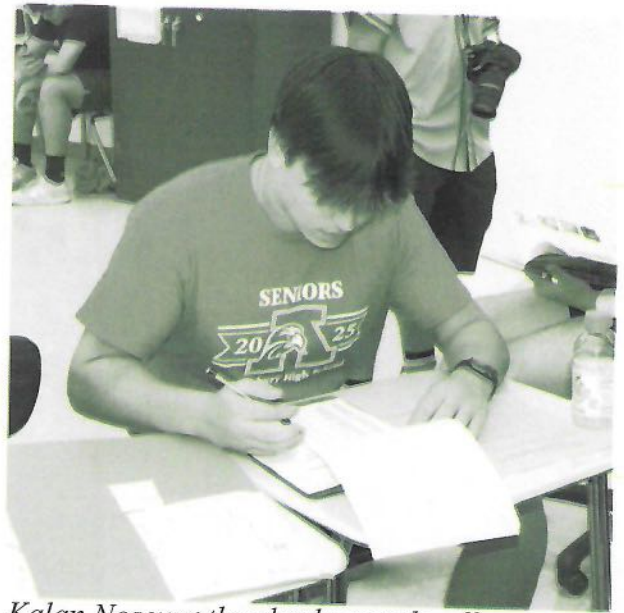

The Pioneers got the ball first but quickly fumbled deep in their own

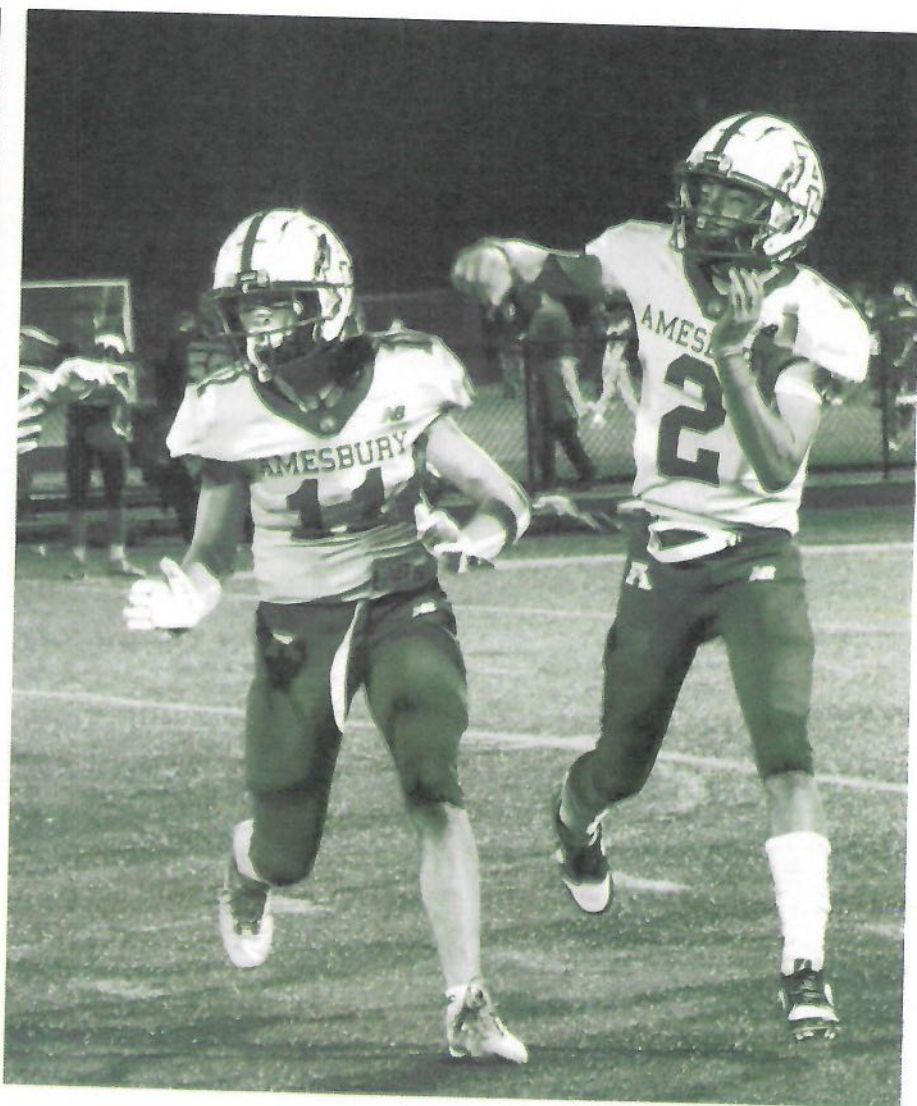

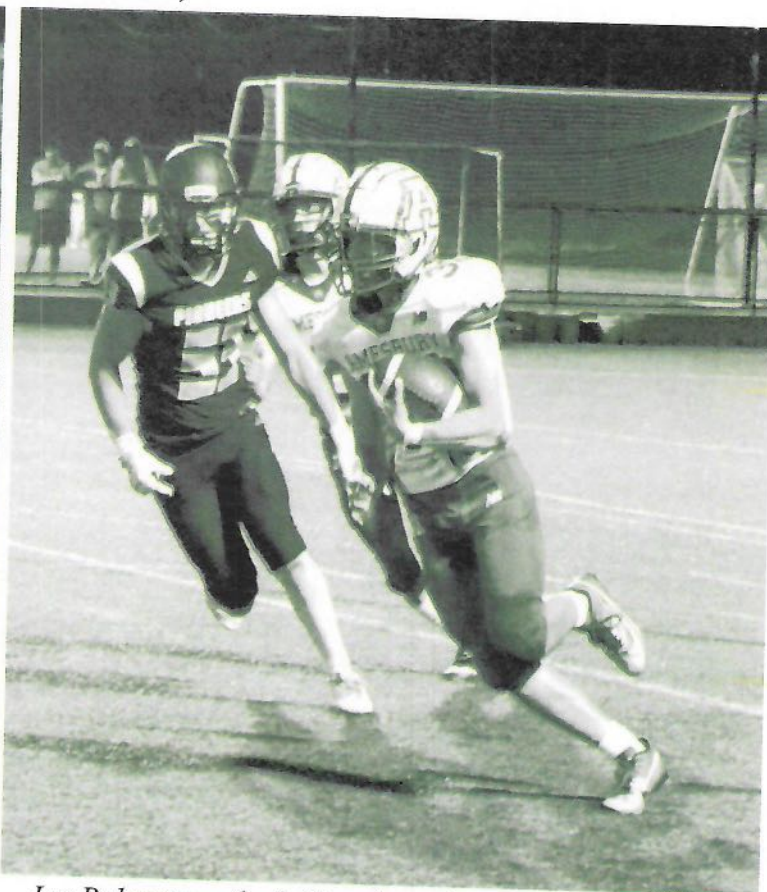

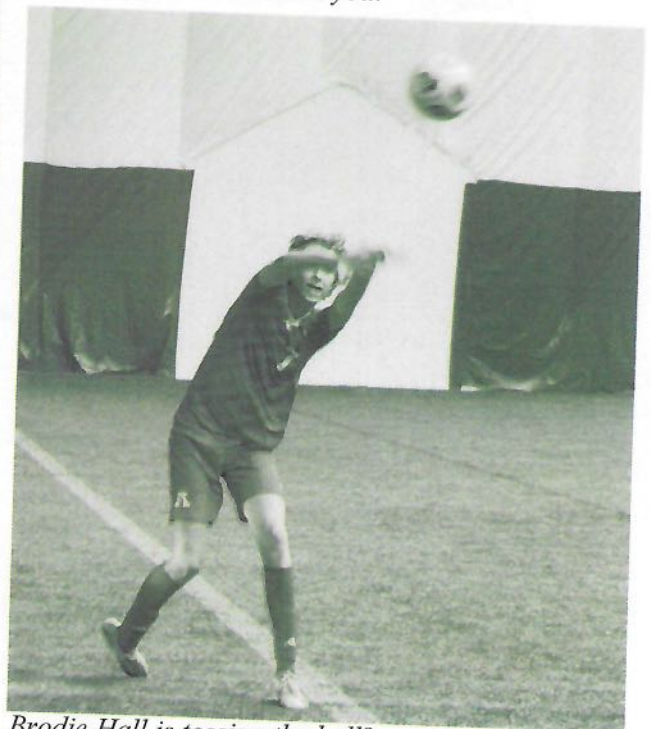

The Amesbury golf team finished up their varsity season last week with three matches in a row from Monday to Wednesday. The first match on Monday was an away match versus North Reading at Hillview Country Club. The boys had a rough match against a team that performs well at home leading the team to lose 164-137. A major highlight for the match was Gus Headrick scoring thirty points in his personal best for the season. Tuesday was the last home match of the year and the team's senior night against Essex Tech. Every senior (John Adams, and captains Jared Black, Jackson Gordon, and Dashiell Bogart), played in the match. The match ended up being a major success for the boys as they got their second win of the season smashing their season high with 169 points compared to Essex Tech's 167 points. Lots of players had good matches with Freshman Jack Kusler having thirty four points, Sophomore Lincoln Kime with twenty eight points, and all three of senior captains Jared Black and Jackson Gordon and, Sophomore Gus Headrick having twenty-seven points. This led the team into their final match of the season versus Ipswich at Ipswich Country Club. The team was able to go out winning back to back games in a close win against Ipswich winning 153-152. Top three scores for the match were Sophomore Lincoln Kime with thirty-one, Freshman Jack Kusler with twenty-nine, and Senior captain Jackson Gordon with twenty-eight. 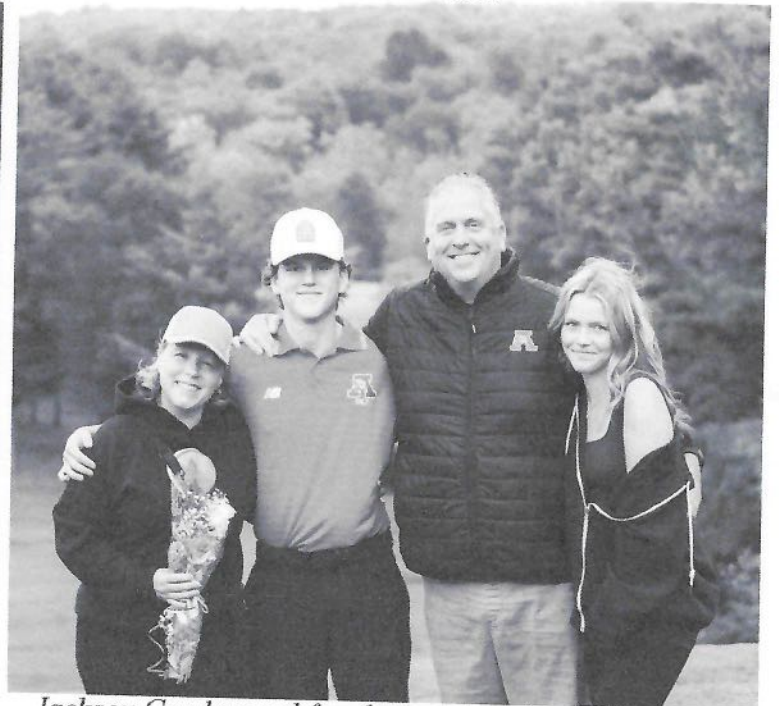

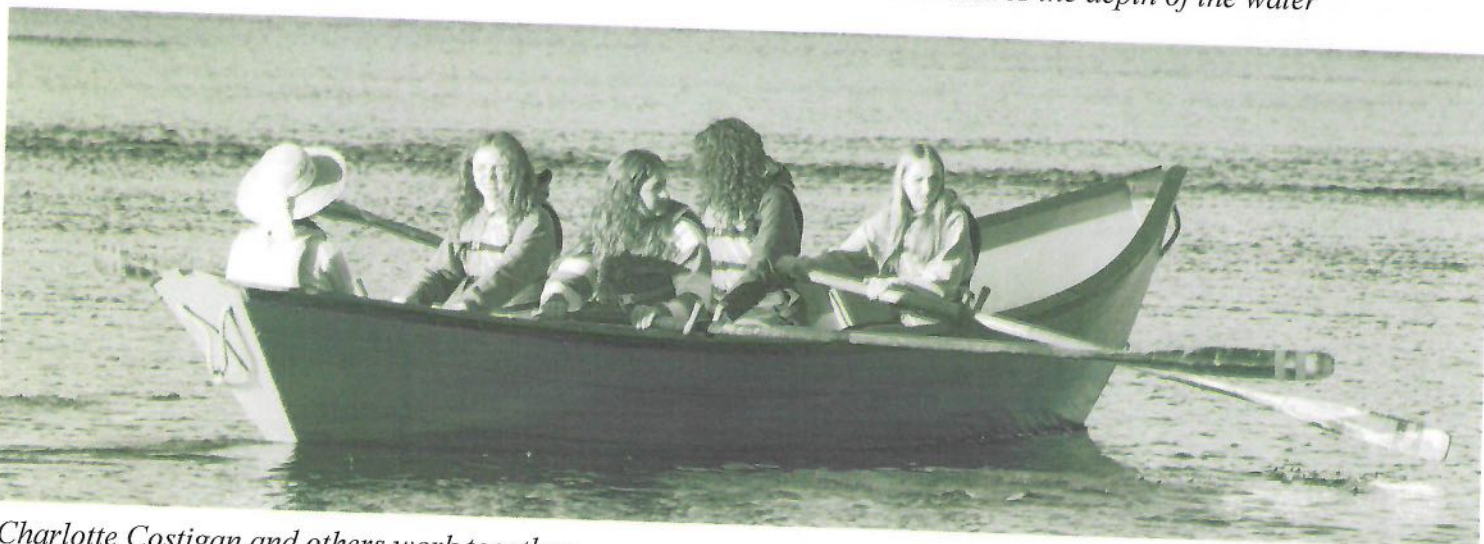

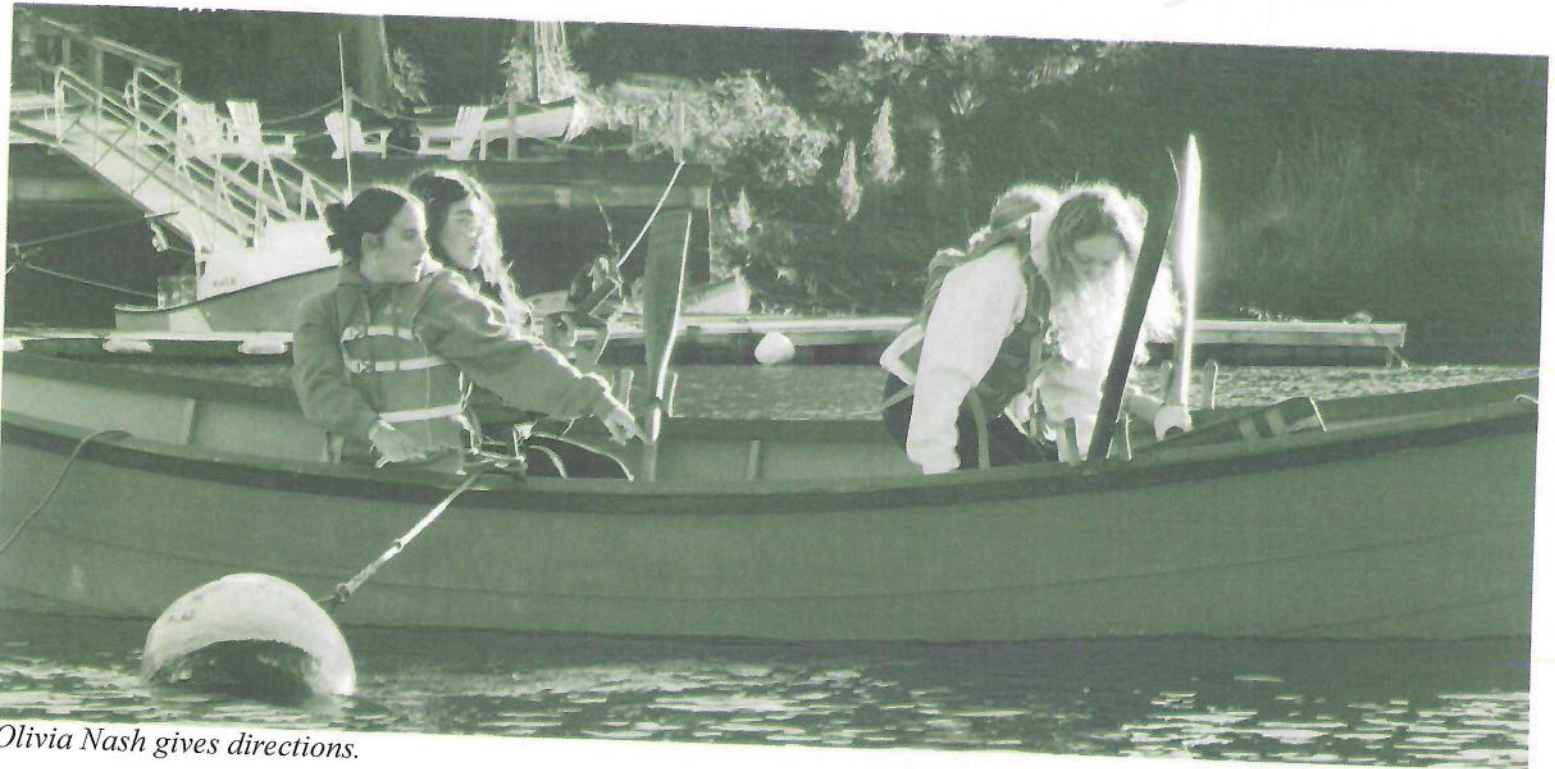
