where they left their stuff, warmed up, and practiced a bit.




If you'd like an example of never give up," just look to hanksgivings Newburyportamesbury football game. Trailing the ntire game until the 1:45 mark of uarter 4, the Redhawks pulled out a 2-38 victory to avenge last year's loss to the Clippers.

It didn't look that way to start. Theoretically, Amesbury should ave lost this game. With a very small oster and ranked two divisions which the Newburyport, the Redhawks should have been the underdogs.

Newburyport scored five minutes in. When Amesbury got the ball back, ney immediately fumbled, giving the lipper great field position for nother score. It was not the defense's nest hour as Newburyport scored gain and the Redhawks found nemselves trailing 14-0. Amesbury of some of it back at the end of eriod as DJ DiCarlo proved why he

is the highest scoring player in the area and quarterback Justin Dube punched it in from the 2 yard line. It was now 14-8 Newburyport at the end of quarter 1. Newburyport scored almost immediately in quarter 2 on a pass. The terrible weather didn't seem to stop the passing game as Amesbury came back for 6 with a trick play from Dube to DiCarlo to Ben Berg. Newburyport scored again two minutes later on a run and DiCarlo answered in the last minute. If it seems like this was just back and forth you'd be right, but Newburyport was capitalizing on its extra point runs. while Amesbury mostly wasn't. It was 30-20 Clippers at the half. The Redhawks received the ball in the third period and Dube punched it in about 3 minutes into the quarter. The yards, however, were being picked up by DiCarlo and Joe Puleo, who had a great day picking up 136 yards. Newburyport scored at the end of the quarter on a 45 yard run. It was now 38-28.

When Amesbury got the ball back it was DiCarlo (124 yards rushing) and Puleo marching down the field. Despite a zillion (it seemed) offside penalties against Amesbury, Dube was able to score about midway through the period and DiCarlo did get the extra points, making it 38-36. This time Amesbury was able to stop the Clippers and Amesbury took their first lead of the game on a DiCarlo score with 1:45 left. But Newburyport had time and mounted a passing drive which took them to about Amesbury's 15 with 5 seconds to go. The next Clipper pass was to the endzone but was knocked away by Parker DeLong and Ben Wood, who eventually came up with the ball. Game over 42-38.
