PEER MEDIATION COMING TO AHS?

Communities across Massachusetts have begun a historic push to incorporate restorative justice into schools. Modern practices, aimed at finding solutions to conflicts and student issues, are being employed as an alternative to out-of-school suspensions and in-school detentions. Amesbury is leading that push thanks to the help of student volunteers, willing staff, and a local organization called The Resolution Center. The Center, a group located in Beverly that has been mediating court cases for three decades, is now graciously training students in the skills to perform mediations. Any two students with an interpersonal conflict, can sign up or be referred to mediation. They will

participate in a completely confidential meeting, in which the two conflicting parties are guided in a discussion by two student mediators. These mediators are trained to be completely neutral and do not create, alter, or sway a solution. Instead, the two parties, if willing, are guided by the mediators to discuss

what happened between them and what they would like to happen moving forward, in order to prevent further conflict. If an attainable agreement is reached, then it is drafted and signed. This process not only seeks to better student climate in the long term, but also provides a non-punishment resource for students involved in a conflict. It leaves no mark on a student's permanent record, and is never discussed outside of the meeting and the arrangement thereof. Students, in appropriate cases, can be referred to mediation instead of receiving a detention or other punishment.

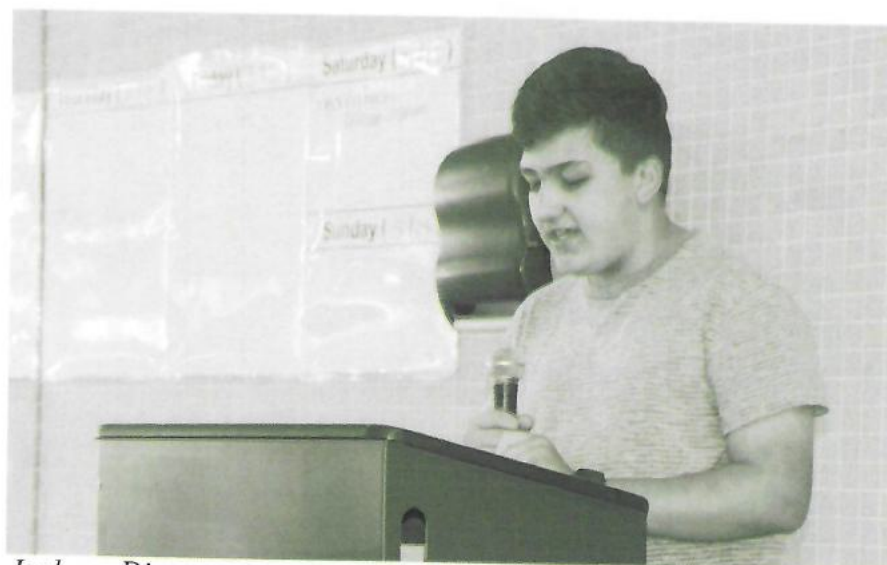

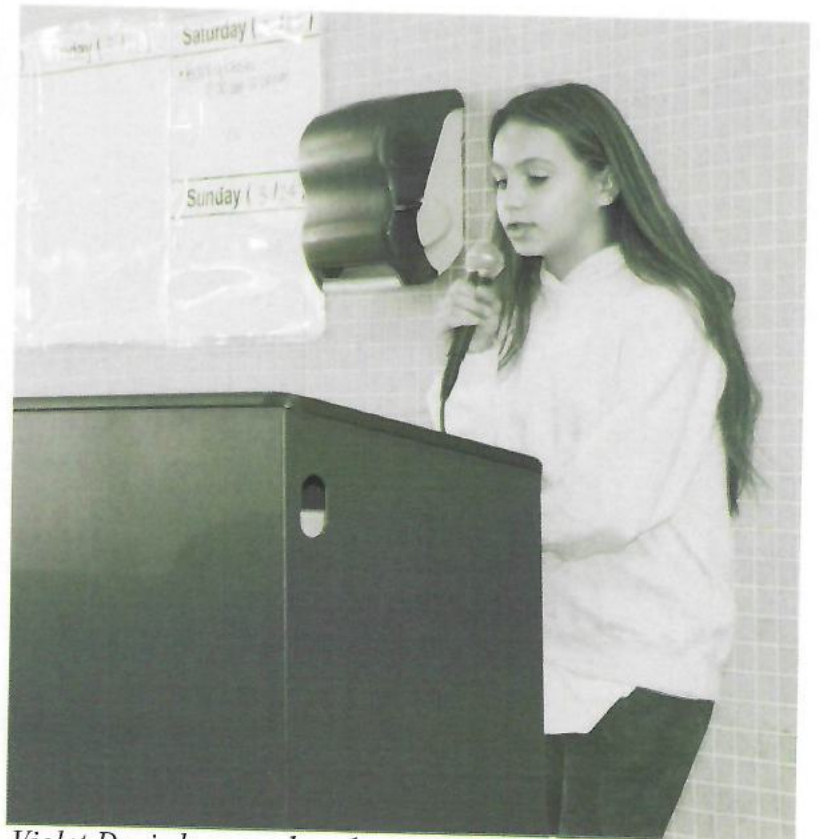

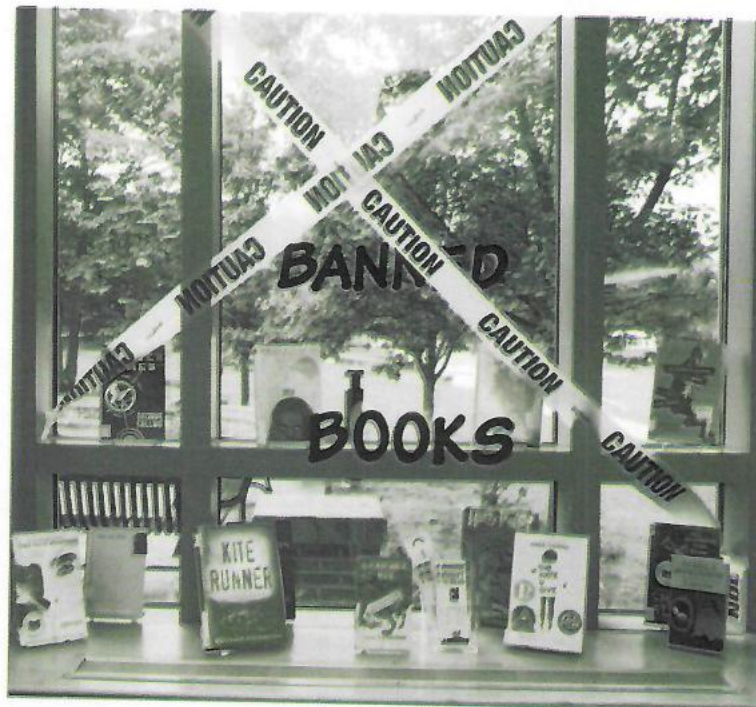
CHECK OUT A BANNED BOOK

September 22-28 is **Banned Books Week**. This is when libraries focus on books that have been "challenged" which means there is a request to have a book removed from the shelves of a library. The American Library Association collects data on Book Challenges, and found over 4000 were targeted for censorship in 2023. Libraries work to defend everyone's right to read what they want under the First Amendment.

The ALA [documented](#) 4,240 unique book titles targeted for censorship in 2023—a 65% surge over 2022 numbers—as well as 1,247 demands to censor library books, materials, and resources. Pressure groups focused on public libraries in addition to targeting school libraries. The number of titles targeted for censorship at public libraries increased by 92% over the previous year, accounting for about 46% of all book challenges in 2023.

Many of the challenged books are famous and/or award winning books but they deal with topics like witchcraft or LGBTQ topics with may conflict with certain people's religion.

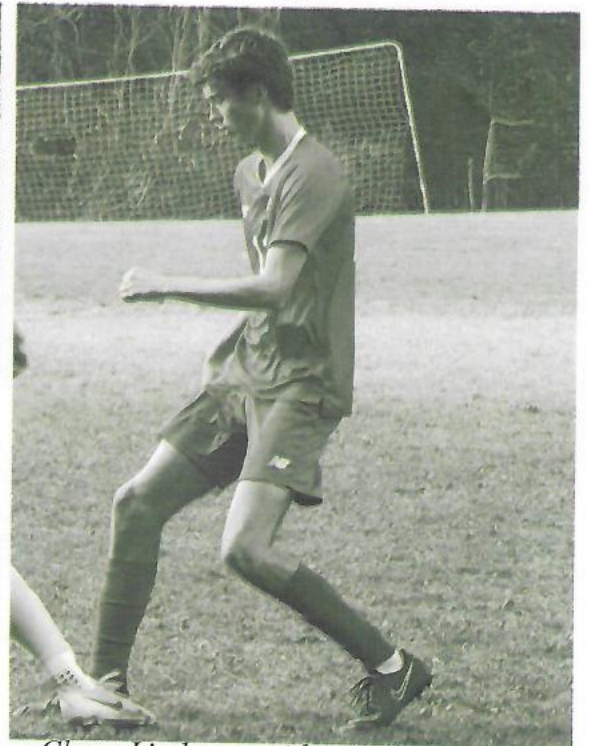

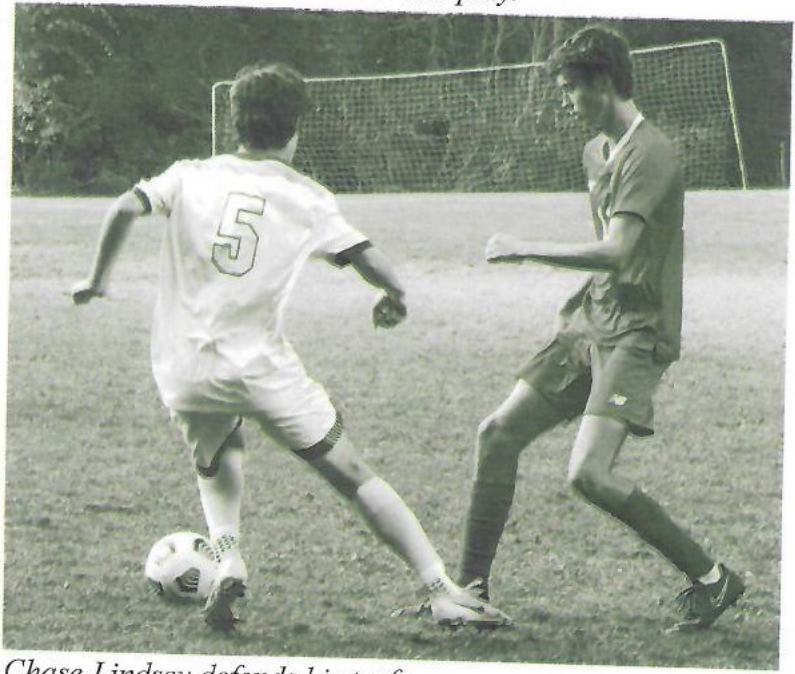

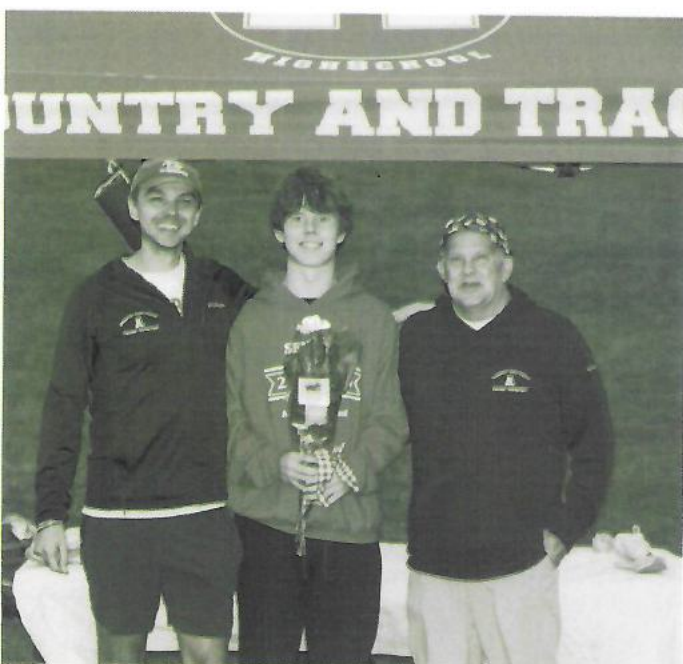

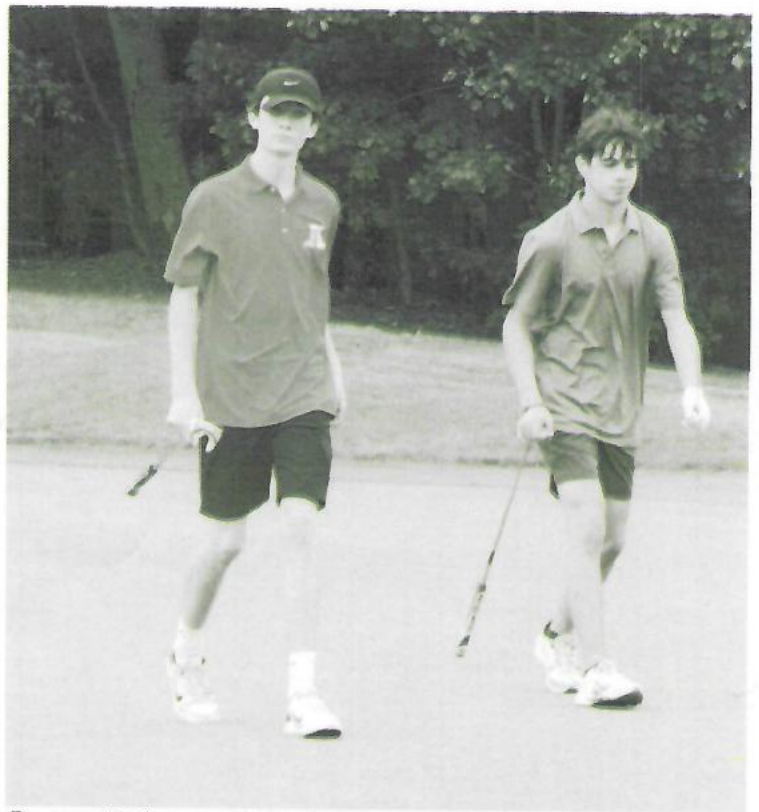

FALL RECIPES!

Now that autumn is officially here, seasonal recipes are making a comeback. Two national fall favorite recipes are apple pie and cinnamon rolls. Whether serving them at a gathering for others or making it as a treat for yourself, The recipes are easy and only require a few ingredients.

Apple Pie:

Prep Time: 30 mins Cook Time: 1 hr
 Total Time: 1 hr 30 mins Servings: 8
 Yield: 1 (9-inch) pie

The ingredients for this pie are simple and easy to find in almost every grocery store.

Ingredients: Granny Smith apples, butter, flour, brown sugar, white sugar, and the pie crust.

1. The first step to making apple pie is to make the filling (unless you're making the crust from scratch as well, but in that case the instructions for the crust are not included in this particular recipe). Start the filling by making a paste from flour and butter. Add sugar and water, and then bring to a boil. After it boils, reduce to a simmer and take off of the heat.

2. Assembling the pie is the next step. Cut up 8 small granny smith apples into thin slices. Press the crust (whether handmade or pre-made) into a pie plate and then add a layer of the apple slices, pouring the filling over the top.

3. Baking the pie is the last and most exciting step. Preheating the oven to 425 degrees F, you will cook the pie for 15 minutes. After 15 minutes, you will reduce the temperature to 350 degrees and then cook for another 35-45 minutes. You will know the pie is done when the crust is golden brown and the apples are soft.

Cinnamon Rolls:

Prep Time: 2 hrs 40 mins Cook Time: 20 mins
 Total Time: 3 hrs Servings: 12
 Yield: 12 cinnamon rolls

The ingredients for these are more complex. You will need active dry yeast, water, whole milk, white and brown sugar, butter, salt, an egg, flour, ground cinnamon, powdered sugar, and vanilla extract.

1. The first step is to make the dough. proof the yeast, and then add it into a bowl with milk, sugar, melted butter, salt and an egg. add flour and knead until smooth, and then for an additional five minutes. Allow the dough to rise in the fridge for an hour and a half. After, take out the dough and roll it out on a pan.

2. The next step is to make the cinnamon filling. spread softened butter on top of the dough, mix sugar and cinnamon together and then sprinkle the mixture over the dough. After, roll the dough tightly and cut into 12 equal portioned pieces. Allow the rolls to rise again for nother hour, until the size is doubled.

3. Now you can bake the rolls! Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F and bake the rolls for 18-22 minutes. While the rolls cook, make the icing. You will need to mix butter and powdered sugar together by themselves for a couple of minutes, and the add in vanilla extract and milk. When the rolls are done, drizzle the frosting over them, and your cinnamon rolls are complete!

ASK PETUNIA-JONES!

Planning a fall picnic!

Dear Petunia,

Due to your well known expertise in the field of all things autumnal, I believe you to be the most adequate person to answer my questions. As you may know, the demand for fall themed food and outings among my employees is at an all time high! Unfortunately, despite my many years of experience, I have no idea how to provide this. I have decided to organize a fall- themed picnic, however I am ignorant in the ways of fall! how do I do this? please help me, Petunia Jones!

Dear Gordan,

I appreciate your question! As an interior/exterior party planner/picnic designer by trade, I have a vast amount of knowledge on this topic! In order to host a perfect picnic you will need 3 things. The first is a good location (since your picnic is autumnal I suggest finding a place with an autumnal color such as red, gold, yellow, or brown). I propose an empty parking lot (bonus points if there are rusty cars, rust is brown, brown is autumnal). The yellow lines in the parking lot will add a touch of autumn to any outdoors experience! If your chosen parking lot has piles of broken glass and empty bottles, even more autumnal. The shards of glass will reflect the autumnal feelings.

Secondly, you will need food (You can see Ryo's column "Fall recipes" on page 20; or you can follow my wise advice)! This is the most important part of any picnic! I highly recommend baking a pumpkin pie (the most autumnal of all pies) and brewing some apple cider. Firstly, in order to make a pumpkin pie, you will need to gather pumpkins. This time of year,

you should be able to find pumpkins on your neighbors front porches, windows, and stairs. Once you have gathered a sufficient amount of pumpkins (around 10) you will need to crush them somehow to unleash their pumpkinny flavor. I suggest running them over repeatedly with your car and then scooping the gunk off of your driveway and into a pie tin. Your pie should also have a crust. I recommend a tortilla, however I understand that procuring a tortilla may be difficult for an amateur chef such as yourself, so a layer of corn chips is also acceptable. You should also concoct some sort of beverage for your employees, apple cider is customary. Apple cider can be made in a similar way as pumpkin pie, however once you crush the apples under your car, scoop the apple chunks into a pitcher and add hot water and cinnamon sticks. Trust me, your food will be a hit! Lastly, you will need to pick some autumnal games to play with your employees. Some popular choices are "Jack O' Lantern carving" (if you have no more pumpkins, you can use the deflated tires of the abandoned cars in your parking lot) and "pin the autumn leaf on the employee" (all you will need for this game are pins and a collection of autumn leaves and employees). Trust me, your employees will remember this picnic forever! If you follow my advice, your day will be successful and full of fall-themed fun!

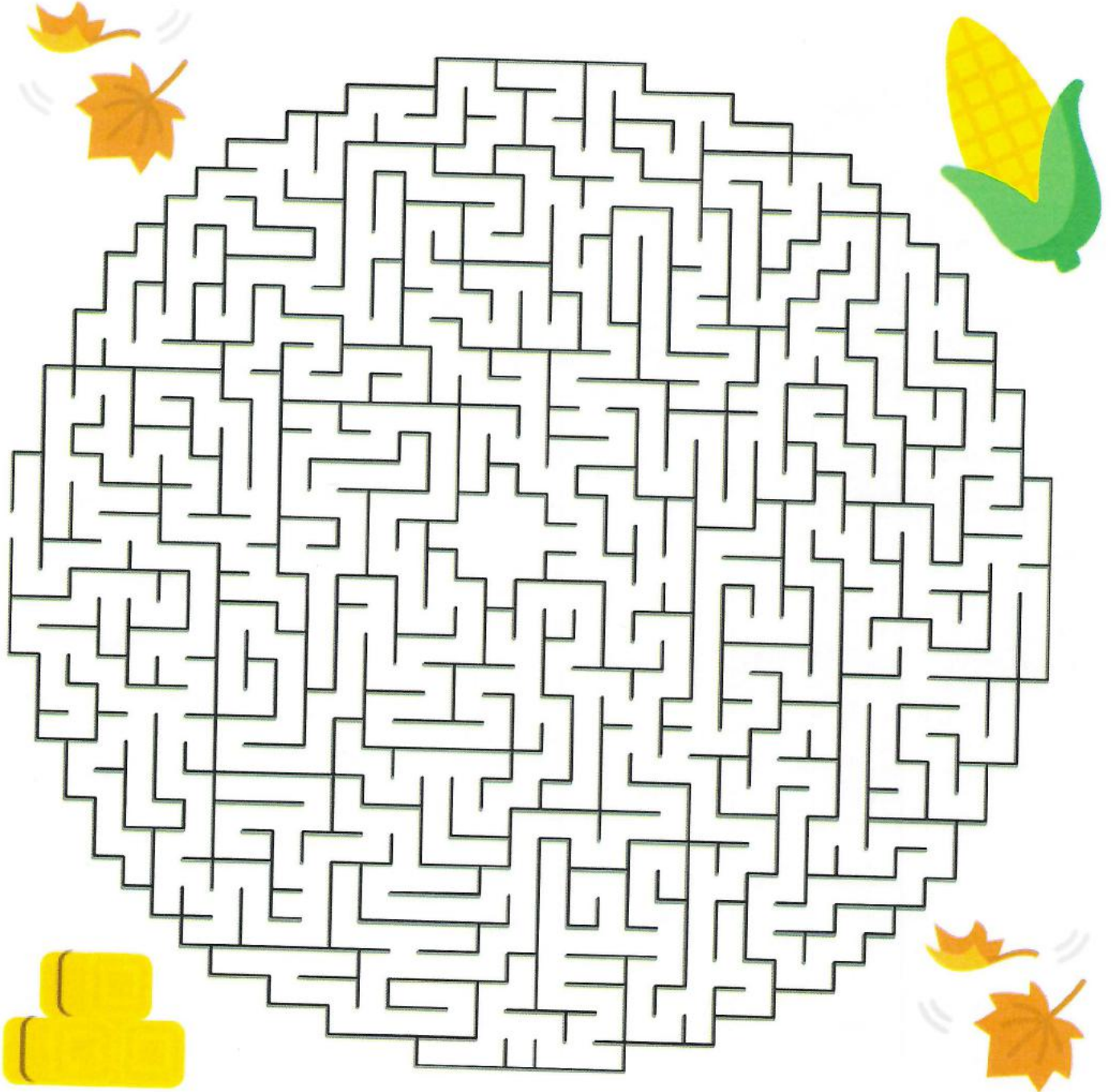

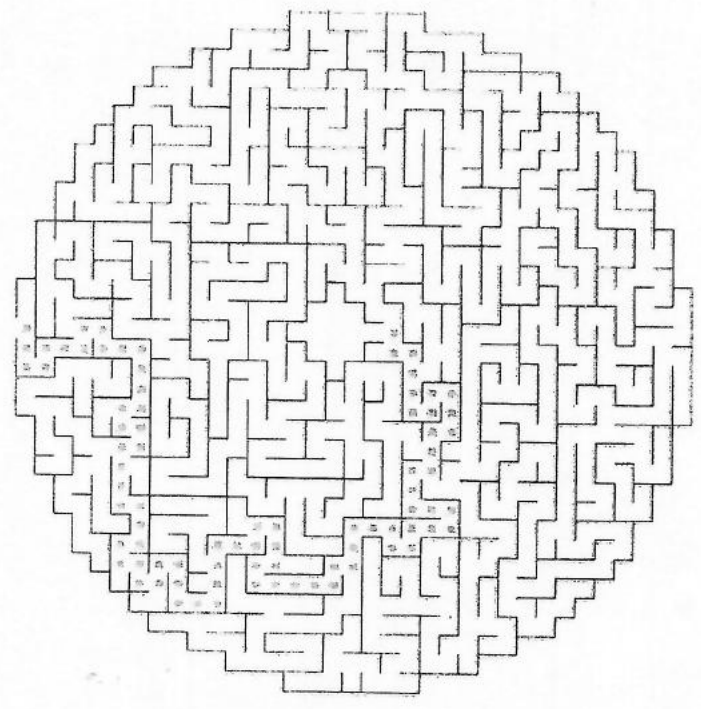

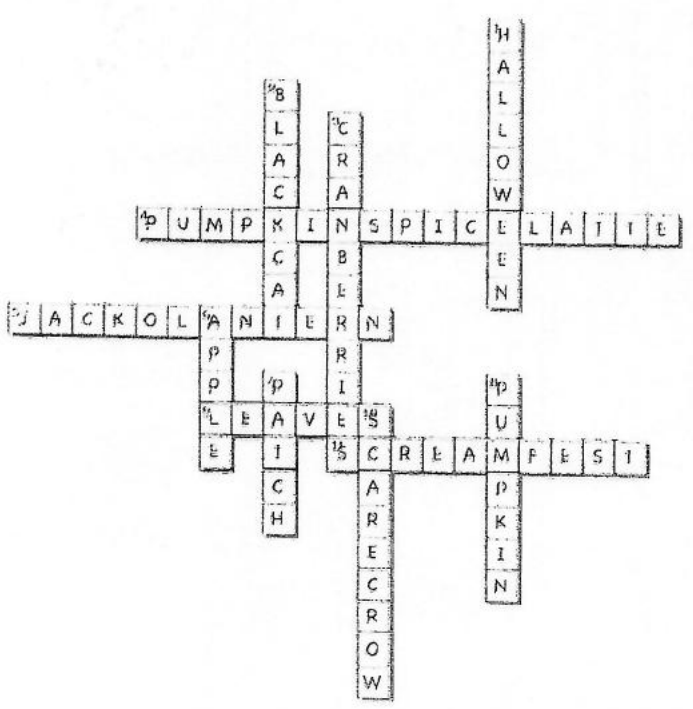
