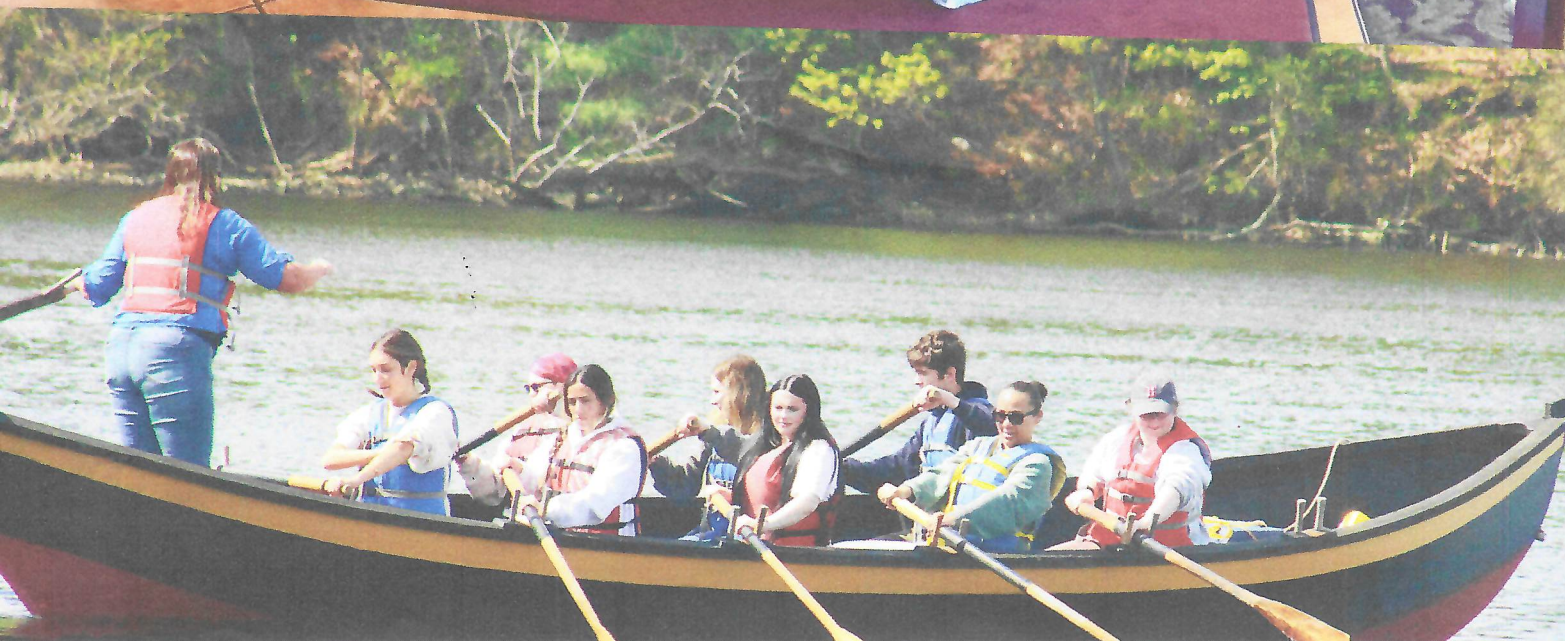

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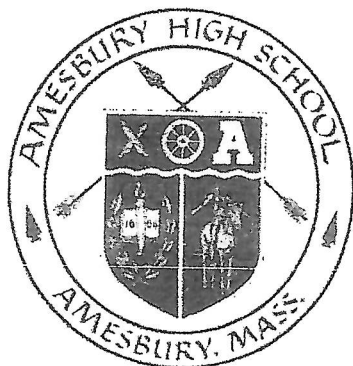

A NEW CLASS OF HONORIES

AEFI

The Amesbury Educational Foundation Inc held it's annual AEFI awards assembly last Friday. It was followed by a banquet that evening, which is essentially a fundraiser. The point of AEFI is to raise money for school projects that the school system might otherwise not be able to fund. Since 2021 they have given away hundreds of thousands of dollars to teachers requesting grants for various cool projects. Teachers send in grant requests and the grants are announced at the end of the banquet.

Each year AEFI picks a former student, a former teacher, and a friend of education to receive it's awards. These are the people whose photos are on the wall outside the auditorium.

The former teacher for this year was Mrs. Gale Regis. She was introduced by Dash Bogart. Regis is an AHS grad class of 1970, who graduated from Salem State and began teaching at the Amesbury Middle School in 1976. She was known at the hands-on teacher who made science come alive. (Yes,

this is Jess Regis's mom.) Among her projects was Beach Day and creating an AMS weather station that was complete with seismometer.

She told the students to keep their options open, stay curious, and choose happiness. She never intended to be a middle school science teacher. First she wanted to be a secretary and then changed to a flight attendant.

Veronika Ruzkova introduced Dr. Steven Sanborn, AHS Class of '83 as

the former student. Sanborn has degrees from Colby College, Plymouth State, and UMASS Lowell. He started out as a biology teacher and eventually became the preK-12 science coordinator for the Andover Public School system, a job from which he is retiring this spring. His two daughters also graduated from AHS. He said AHS has a sense of community "This place has a soul."

Kylie Desmond introduced Holly Shay, mother of the late Jordan Shay, for which the new elementary school is named. Shay has a degree in social work from Salem State

and works as a clinical social worker. After Jordan was killed in the middle east, she stated the Sr. Jordan Shay memorial foundation. At first this was part of AEFI, but in 2017 it became an independent organization which gives out educational grants and scholarships. Shay is an example of someone who turned a horrible situation into something good and positive.

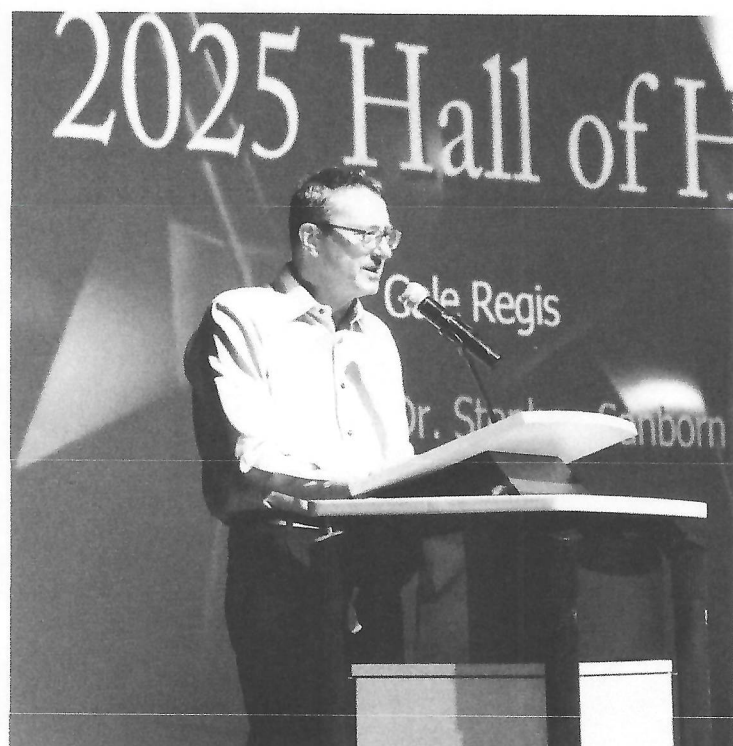

BOYS TRACK WINS CAL AGAIN

Track

Even before this week's track meet against Hamilton-Wenham, the boys track team had it all locked up with a victory over Lynnfield last Wednesday. The Amesbury Boys Track Team defended their Cape Ann League Baker Division title for the 5th year in a row by defeating Lynnfield 81 to 64.

Picking up first place finishes were Lincoln Kime low hurdles 64.9sec. and high hurdles 19.4sec, Dane Hall pole vault 9', Marcus Colon discus 128'6", Harrison Sullivan mile 5:11.4, Brody Hall 800m 2:17.1, Josiah two mile 11:11.1, and the mile relay team of Lincoln Kime, Kawusu Jalloh, Trey Sullivan and Justin Dube 3:51.9sec. It was nice to see the boys defend the Baker Division this year after losing a lot of high end athletes from last year's team. A lot of the younger athletes are stepping up and really starting to contribute.

The Amesbury girls improved to 2-1 on the season defeating Lynnfield 92.5 to 52.5. Picking up first place finishes were Lindsey Williamson low hurdles 70.7 sec, triple jump 33'7", and high hurdles 16.7 sec, Katie Ishihara 400m 62.6sec, and 200m 27.7 sec, Julia Losee shot put 27'2", and discus 85'6", Violet Davis mile 5:34, and 800m 2:35.4, Katherine Bigos high jump 4'8", Sadie Bolth javelin 90'1", Kaia Bartosik 100m 13.3 sec, and the 4 x100m relay team of Kaia Bartosik, Ruby Edmond, Lexi Desmond and Lauren Talbot 54.5 sec. 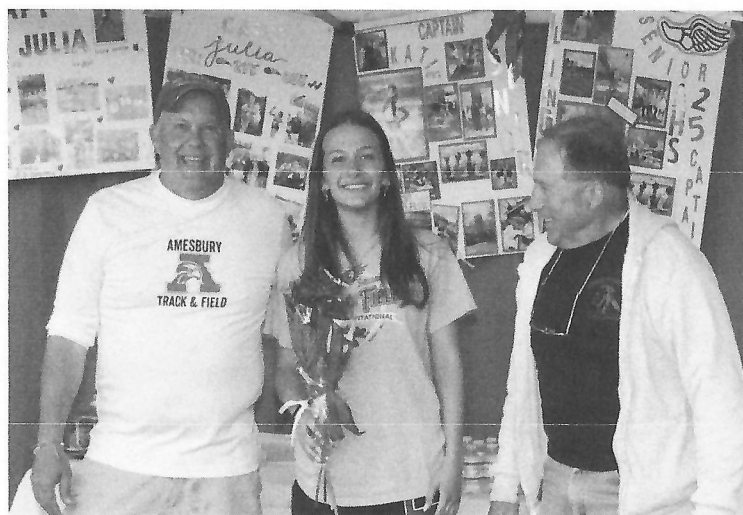

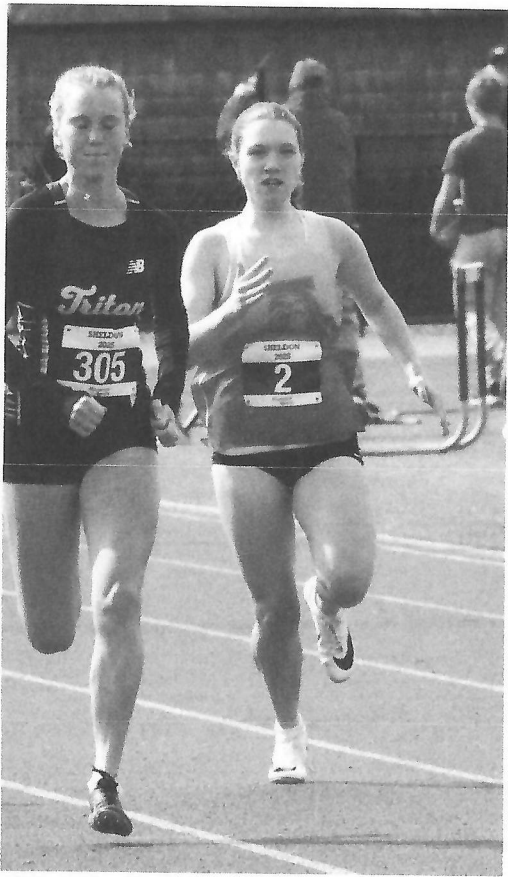
